Full Sun Is Best

To keep your Sunbasket looking lush, and for the best fruit production, hang it in full sun. Look for a spot that gets six to eight hours of sun a day.

Helpful Tips

·Remember that your Sunbasket is portable. If you feel it is not getting enough sun, simply move it to another spot. Likewise, if a storm is coming, or a frost later in the season, you can move it temporarily to a protected location.

·Our Strawberry Sunbasket is a perennial; you can move it into the garage over the winter if you like, but it is a durable plant and should be able to last the winter outdoors.



Edible Sunbaskets

A charming Edible Sunbasket is a great conversation starter. At first glance it's a beautiful spring basket overflowing with colorful blooms and foliage, but look again and there's an interesting twist: fruit! Our Tomato Sunbasket is overflowing with bright red cherry tomatoes and our Strawberry Sunbasket produces lots of luscious, sweet red strawberries. Just find a sunny spot on the balcony, deck, or patio to hang your unique décor garden.



Special Strawberry Sunbasket

Our Strawberry Sunbasket is truly special. On one plant you'll see blooms in three different colors: red, pink, and white. That's in addition to the bright red berries dangling over the side and the backdrop of glossy dark green foliage. It's a feast for the eyes—and simply a feast. You can harvest the sweet, juicy fruit as soon as it turns red, and you'll be harvesting all summer! Plus the Strawberry plant is a perennial so it will be back again in spring.

A Little TLC

Your Sunbasket pretty much takes care of itself but it does need water. Try watering right before your favorite show comes on TV, or before you make your morning smoothie. If you associate watering with a fun activity you're more likely to remember to do it!

Bumper Crop

Sunbaskets are loved for their beauty but they also produce an abundance of Strawberries or Tomatoes with standard full sun and regular water. You can relax and simply harvest the fruit as it ripens, or when you're in the mood for a snack. No special care is required.

If you are an avid gardener in a small space and would like to maximize the fruit harvest, fertilize your Strawberry Sunbasket every three to four weeks, or your Tomato Sunbasket every two weeks.

Tomato SunPatio

If you're looking for a standing planter rather than a hanging basket try our Tomato SunPatio. You'll get the same lush Tomato plant and coco fiber soil that fills our Sunbasket, only in a sturdy, decorative planter with a trellis for support. These fruits look so cute tumbling out of the pot on the vine, and there are lots of them. After you eat your fill, go on and share the wealth with family, friends, and neighbors!

Tempting Tomato Sunbasket

Our Tomato Sunbasket produces a profusion of sweet, ruby red fruits that are perfect for salads and snacking! There is nothing like the tang of a fresh, home-grown Tomato straight from the vine, and these Tomatoes pop when you bite into them!

Whenever you get a hankering for a burst of juicy Tomato flavor you'll have an abundance of tasty fruits within picking distance.

Specifically Bred For Baskets

We've chosen a Tomato that has been specifically bred to thrive in hanging baskets. It's a cherry variety so the fruit is small, but many cherries grow on super long vines that need to be trellised. Unless you plan to hang the basket off a third floor balcony that's too much overflow for a spiller. This Tomato has sturdy stems that stop at just the right length, and the plant blooms heavily with attractive sprays of standard Tomato flowers.

Small, But Meaty In The Middle

Actually, these small fruits are at the larger end of the cherry scale. They border on plum-size but come in just under the wire. You'll find they are very thick-walled and meaty, so in addition to salads and snacks Sunbasket Tomatoes are great for making sauce.
